#### Mow-trim-weed!

That's how we made our money growing up. First for Bessie Mahoney who cared for unwed mothers and for an aging, ailing father, Mr. Mapson. I weeded

her property often with an older brother. Once we dug up an entire scrap cement sidewalk of hers 'cause Dave thought it easier than weeding between the closely placed bits and pieces of concrete. Seem to remember we had some difficulty fitting the pieces back together again and raising them above flood-stage! For Bill Schmidt, former Nebraska teacher and, I believe, principal who taught me my 9 times tables showing how if you added one number to the tens column while decreasing one number in the units column...well, those were the products of the nine times tables! For Nina Hager, wife of Hager Bros. cement contractor, Royal Hager, for Mrs. Snodgrass a time or two... she the mother-in-law of long-time County Supervisor William Hirstein, for a widow of a former principal of Orange High who lived on Orange Street here in town. This is the Orange High when it was located where Chapman University now stands. Can still hear her saying, "Go out & get the mower machine. It's out behind in the tool shed"...an old garage with side-sliding entry suspended on a rail with rusted metal rollers. Problem, after getting that dang door open, was the mower itself - it had all-metal wheels which slid on wet grass and you got no purchase! Then there was Mrs. Blaine & Mrs.. Barton & the dog whose gigantic head easily looked over a 5 ft fence scaring me half to death and whose chain pinned the Mrs. to her clothes line pole once! For Mrs. Sondericker whose berry patch was overrun by difficult-to-

remove bermuda grass. For Emma Klintworth-Nielsen, my grandmother's friend, who came to Orange from near Paso Robles where mom's people lived from 1887 to 1918. And then every Saturday for three homes on north Glassell, one of which was occupied by the taxi dispatcher for the city of Orange.. She collected from her neighbors and we walked to the former Pacific Electric Railway Depot on the 100 block of N. Lemon St. west of town to pick up our pay.



We got about a dollar an hour for these jobs although one dear older neighbor with a double wide lawn lived enough in the past that she paid just \$.50 for the two lawns and then threw in a dime for ice cream...Sigh! Ah, those were the days.

**Orange International Street Fair on September 1-3, 2023** will be mark 50 years since the start of the event. Authorized by Mayor Jess Perez in 1973, the fair was inspired by the 1910 Orange Street Fair. The Covid 19 Virus swept the fair off the street in 2020, but retuned again the following year.

Sunday, September 5th, 1976 was quite warm earlier in the day when this photo was taken. Orange Fire Department Paramedics, Tom Thies and Tom Williams are standing in front of the fire department's first paramedic van. The advanced life-safety program had started in 1974 and Orange's only paramedic van then. I'm surprised it was standing still long enough to be photographed in the Plaza. A little later that day, the clouds rolled up from the southeast and the skies opened up with driving rain and wind. Fair attendees scattered for cover when lightening started crackling overhead. Rain cooled the air and eventually moved off, but it was a memorable conclusion to the 3rd annual street fair.
