
Tuesday, November 14, 2023

world, bringing retail merchandise right into the home and a bit of entertainment too. My cousin's recent Facebook post takes us back to the way it once was and may still be in a few homes...



Lyle Mack Recollects...

Sep 7, 2023 "Today I read the newspaper on the IPAD. I rarely read the comics. I don't look at what few ads there are. I look over the death notices."

Sep 7, 2020

"...When I picked up the Sunday paper yesterday, a picture of the old Sunday paper of years ago surfaced in my brain.

The Sunday paper was huge. The comics were always on the outside. There were two sections of comics. Besides the news there was a whole sports section, a society section, an entertainment section, advertisement from all the big department stores and grocery stores, a real estate section, automotive section and classified adds. There was a magazine and lots of inserts.

The Santa Ana Register was delivered to our home. After church my dad drove to Walker's Market on Tustin Avenue to buy a Los Angeles Examiner newspaper. I want to say that the Sunday paper cost 25 cents. When we would arrive home, my dad would sit on the couch with the newspaper. No one got a section of the paper until my dad was finished with the section. He let us sit next to him and we could read the comics as he read them. Sometimes he would share his beer while he read, only one sip per kid. We would spend a lot of time going through the Sunday paper.

After the newspapers were read they were used to line trash cans and garbage cans. The papers were always used for something before they were incinerated. I remember going to Newport Beach to buy fish. Upon purchase of fresh caught fish, the fish were wrapped in newspaper."

Ah, yes... Lyle brings back similar memories for me— Dad in his recliner, newspaper spread across his lap,

deep in thought. For me, at least on Sundays, it was the "funnies" that were high on my post-Sunday-school agenda! I read both sections and all the strips! Especially



loved, Charles Schulz's column "Peanuts." Paper, for us, served many of the same purposes my cousin outlined. Plus we often used newspapers to clean house and car windows! Not exactly sure today why the black ink didn't come off on the windows. Nevertheless, inked or not, our windows would always receive a few quick swipes from the Register before final maternal inspection.

But my favorite use of all for used newspapers certainly was as kindling for amazing backyard incinerator fires in the open—topped 55 gallon drums Dad would occasionally bring home from his work. These unrestrained fires had a bit of the same flavor and thrill as Fourth of July fireworks when the updraft carried 6 inch edge-flaming flecks of carbon high into the sky before cooling air dropped them, usually harmlessly, back to the earth...

Yes, I remember, and I'm guessing so do you. Newspapers—you got to love them. Part of our history, and still present in the city of Orange.
